"The first planes were incredibly basic, incredibly minimalistic and incredibly intelligent. All planes are just an upgrade of this idea: There's nothing new, just details on details on details. When my father was 15, he [built] his first plane in his mother's garden. After that, he designed, developed and built his own planes. He also piloted and crashed them. Like me. I didn't create my plane, but I pilot and I crash."
